Orientalist Museum

The Orientalist Museum has one of the most significant collections of Orientalist art ever assembled in the world and offers a unique ideology of Orientalist art history because it is the only institution in the world dedicated solely to Orientalist art. Its approximate 900 paintings, watercolours, drawings and prints, as well as sculpture and applied art trace Orientalism back to the early 16th century.

Qatar National Museum

The Qatar National Museum opened in 1975 in a restored palace originally built in the early 20th century by Sheikh Abdullah bin Jassim Al-Thani. It served as his family residence and the seat of government for approximately 25 years. In addition to the original Amiri Palace, the former Qatar National Museum included a Museum of the State, a lagoon and a very popular marine aquarium. In 1980 the building won the Agha Khan award for restoration and rehabilitation of Islamic architecture. The National Museum of Qatar is currently closed and the new museum is scheduled to open in December 2014.

The museum has been established to preserve and display the different collections of arts and artifacts accumulated by Sheikh Faisal over the years from around the world. The exhibit focuses on Middle Eastern and Islamic history and culture, reflecting the interest of the Qatari people in their national heritage and cultural identity; a cultural movement supported by Sheikh Faisal. The museum contains some of the finest and most important examples of Arabic manuscripts, fine arts and militaria. Ethnographic Museum
